

## CV2 Conceptual Understanding/Freedom/Dictionary/Inductive

### Instructions

- Go to EASE History - <http://www.easehistory.org/>
- Search on “Civil Rights Movement” in EASE History. [Search: EASE History Historical Events>Protest Movements>Civil Rights Movement]
- Column 1: Examine the cases that appear in Column 1 of the chart. (In EASE History, campaign ads and historical events are treated as cases.)
- Column 2: Select a dictionary entry that is a good match with the case. If applicable, match multiple dictionary entries with each case. Write the number of the entry (or numbers of the entries) in Column 2.
- Column 3: Briefly explain in 1 to 2 sentences why the entry and the case are a good match.

After completing the task, groups will share their findings with the whole class.

### Freedom *n.*

- 1 The condition of being free of restraints.
- 2 Liberty of the person from slavery, detention, or oppression.
- 3
  - a. Political independence.
  - b. Exemption from the arbitrary exercise of authority in the performance of a specific action; civil liberty: *freedom of assembly*.
- 4 Exemption from an unpleasant or onerous condition: *freedom from want*.
- 5 The capacity to exercise choice; free will: *We have the freedom to do as we please all afternoon*.
- 6 Ease or facility of movement: *loose sports clothing, giving the wearer freedom*.
- 7 Frankness or boldness; lack of modesty or reserve: *the new freedom in movies and novels*.
- 8
  - a. The right to unrestricted use; full access: *was given the freedom of their research facilities*.
  - b. The right of enjoying all of the privileges of membership or citizenship: *the freedom of the city*.
- 9 A right or the power to engage in certain actions without control or interference: “the seductive freedoms and excesses of the picaresque form” (John W. Aldridge).
